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5 For count nouns a) He has few friends. He is sad. (almost none, negative) b) He has a few friends. He is happy. (some, positive)

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11 He is a simpleton. -ve a) (a fool, a person without the usual ability to use reason and understand) He is a simple person. +ve D) (no show-off, a good quality)



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12 a) I remembered to meet him. b) I remembered meeting him.

a) I remembered to meet him. (...so I was able to meet him.) **b)** I remembered meeting him. (I remembered that event happening before that point) **Remember + to + verb**
Ifuture **Remember + V-ing**

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Remember + to + verb **Remembering will take place** first and then the action **Remember + V-ing** Past action that you remember now, so first action and then remembering

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Patterns for future

- I will meet the manager. About 50% a) (neutral future, instant decision) I'm going to meet the manager **)**) About 70% tomorrow. (speaker's intension, decision) I am meeting the manager About 90% tomorrow. (definite, arranged, planned future,
 - as sure as is happening now)

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15 a) You should start your own business. (advice, it is good for you) b) You could start your own business. (a tentative suggestion)



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16 a) He is wont to yawn while talking. b) He wants to yawn while talking.



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16 a) He is wont to yawn while talking. (habitual, the way someone usually behaves) b) He wants to yawn while talking. (wishes, desires) **Compare: He won't yawn. (will not)**



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17 a) I'm teaching English. b) I've been teaching English for an hour / since 5 p.m.



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17 a) I'm teaching English. (Pr. **Cont. Tense. = continuity now)** b) I've been teaching English for an hour. (Pr. Perf. Cont. **Tense.** =continuity from past to present, a period of time)



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General introduction My name is ... I have been working in.... as for ... (period)... / since ... (point)... . I am good at Noun/V-ing.... My goal/ambition is to ...

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I wish + simple past (regret now, -ve message) I wish I was/were a bird. (=Alas, I am not a bird.) I wish I knew the answer. (=Alas, I don't know the answer) I wish I had more money. I wish she was present today. I wish I could. I wish she was/were tall.

a) I've seen it. Sub + has/have + p.p. = V3rd form (result of a past action without time) b) I saw it in 2010. Sub + V 2nd form + past time (reporting a past event with a past time)

a) I wrote a letter yesterday. (reporting a finished action) b) I was writing a letter at 5 p.m. (reporting continuity of an action at a past point of time)

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22 a) Can I speak to Maya, please? (informal, friendly) **b)** Could I speak to Maya, please? (formal, polite)



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23 a) She has to do it. b) She can do it.



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23 a) She has to do it. (compulsory, no option) b) She can do it. (free to do if she likes)



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24 a) You mustn't do it. b) You needn't do it.



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24 a) You mustn't do it. (warning, prohibition, strict no-no) b) You needn't do it. (not necessary)

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37 a) When she arrived, we were having dinner. b) When she arrived, we had dinner. c) When she arrived, we had had dinner.

a) When she arrived, we were having dinner. (we were in the middle of our dinner) b) When she arrived, we had dinner. (we started dinner **AFTER she arrived.)** c) When she arrived, we had had dinner.
